

On offer here are beautiful works by Salman Rushdie in excellent condition.

Note that in the following catalogue "signed" always means signed by (Sir) Salman Rushdie and in many cases the books were signed upon publication—the visible change in Rushdie's hand is testimony to this—so at times when Rushdie's signature was pretty difficult to get.

This catalogue is divided into two parts:

Part 1 (items 1 to 43): Rushdie's works in chronological order from *Grimus* (1974) to *Fury* (2001) and some miscellaneous items from that period (items 44 to 55).

Part 2 (items 56 to 95 and counting): these are items that we have picked up since 2004, when we first published this catalogue. For latest additions, please just scroll down to the very end.

Some of the items that were or are offered in this catalogue are extremely rare: some are unique, some exist in fewer than a handful of copies, some are officially limited items.




Most of all: just enjoy the writings of Salman Rushdie and the many variants you may find in this catalogue.


## Grimus


0. London: Gollancz, 1974. First Edition, First Printing. Two very rare copies of the proof, one of which came with a dustwrapper and a laid-in note from Victor Gollancz Ltd. announcing publication on the 6<sup>th</sup> of February 1975. We never owned either of these copies, but have added them to our catalogue for your reference.





1. London: Gollancz, 1975. First Edition, First Printing. Book is fine except for a small scratch across fore edge and an ink spot on lower paste down. Dustwrapper with minimal rubbing along spine ends. Signed by the author on the title page below his printed name; judging from the signature in the early 80ies. Rushdie's first book, a complete dud, as promising as Raymond Chandler as a young love poet. CHF 1'750.





2. New York: The Overlook Press, 1979. First U.S. Edition, First Printing. Except for the rather telling remainder mark on the bottom edge this is a fine copy. Signed by the author on the title page. The Woodstock Generation People must have been really stoned when they decided to publish this. Even after four years in coma it remained unreadable. When it was then first published in Germany many years later (would you believe it?), the reviewers all went: "What have we done to deserve this?" Sold.

# Midnight's Children

3. New York: Alfred A. Knopf, 1981. First U.S. Edition, First Printing. The very rare American uncorrected proof copy, signed by the author on the title page. Ex-library copy, without half title (there are copies with it), bound in transparent self-adhesive plastic sheet (by another librarian who must have hated books). Top edge and front cover with small coffee stains, staple holes to first three pages, but still an acceptable copy. Apart from the 1980 English proof, of which only around ten copies are known to exist, this is the earliest version of *Midnight's Children* and rarely offered for sale. Sold.






- 4. New York: Alfred A. Knopf, 1981. First U.S. Edition, First Printing. Top and bottom edges slightly stained, front board with two staple holes and browning at the bottom, but still very good. Dustwrapper slightly creased along top and bottom edges with three tears on the front, spine and back, yet very good, without any loss, the colour still fresh, without the usual fading. Signed by the author on the half title. The true first of a milestone, and a very reasonable and signed copy at a fair price at that. Sold.
- 5. London: Jonathan Cape, 1981. First Edition, First Printing. Pristine: The Perfect Copy. No fading to the boards or dustwrapper, no "you name what" defects. In addition to the flawless condition, this is one of three copies that a book enthusiast took to Rushdie's home in London upon publication and had him sign on the title page. The signature is nothing like the scrawl you get today, but strikingly full, long and beautiful, and really very different from anything we have seen over the years. One of only 2500 copies (650 of which went to libraries upon publication). After the failure of *Grimus*, Rushdie cut down his 900 page narrative entitled *Madame Rama* and produced—with the help of his publishing agent Liz Calder—this 446 page gem. Since Rushdie didn't know many famous people at that time, only the dedication copy or the copy to his agent could be more important, but certainly not more beautiful. Sold.






6. No Place: No Publisher (but probably Piper in Germany), 1982. Salman Rushdie fotografiert von Isolde Ohlbaum (1982). A lovely promotional poster of a black and white photograph of the author, landscape, 43 by 28.6 cm, showing Salman Rushdie wearing a hat and winter coat; the following legend printed below the picture to its right: "Salman Rushdie fotografiert von Isolde Ohlbaum (1982)." Signed by Rushdie on the coat. Fine. CHF 400.


7. London: Vintage, 1999. The Screenplay of *Midnight's Children*. First Edition, First Printing in wrappers. There was no hardcover edition. With an introduction by Salman Rushdie and signed by him on the title page upon publication. As new. CHF 150.



## Shame

8. London: Jonathan Cape, 1983. First Edition, First Printing. A fine copy in a fine dustwrapper, signed by the author upon publication. The book that didn't win the Booker and ruined Rushdie's reputation, because he felt it should have won and said so. We agree in that he should not have lost to *Life & Times of Michael K*. He should have lost to *Waterland*. CHF 600.






9. London: Jonathan Cape, 1983. First Edition, First Printing. Small biro mark on front edge, little rubbing to lower boards, else fine. Dustwrapper is fine. Signed by the author on the title page. Not a winner of the Booker, yet a good read. Sold.


# The Jaguar Smile

- 10. London: Pan Books/Picador, 1987. First Edition, First Printing. A new copy with less than the usual paper browning. Inscribed by the author: "to Bill [Buford] / with best / wishes / Salman / 5.2.87." Unread by the recipient, who decided to sell the book and live and write among the thugs. The earliest presentation copy we have been able to locate and certainly one of the first. Inscribed and dated books by Rushdie are scarce anyway. Sold.
- 11. London: Pan Books/Picador, 1987. First Edition, First Printing. Wrappers with some minor creases and rubbing, else fine with the usual paper browning. Signed by the author on the title page. CHF 250.

12. New York: Viking, 1987. First U.S. Edition, First Printing. A fine copy of the first U.S. edition and first hardcover edition anywhere. Signed by the author on the title page. CHF 200.










- 13. Black Oak Books Broadside. Berkeley: West Coast Print Center, 1987. A beautiful broadsheet, 20 by 41 cm, produced on occasion of a reading of *The Jaguar Smile* by Rushdie and signed by him at the bottom. One sheet, printed on the recto only. Fine. Sold.
- 14. Oxford: ISIS Large Print, 1989. First large print Edition, First Printing. A fine copy of the first and only English hardcover edition. Signed by the author on the title page. Illustrated boards as issued. Sold.

## The Satanic Verses

15. No Place: Privately Printed, 1988. First Edition, First Printing. As New. A ringbound photocopy of the fair copy of the author's typescript showing the final but very substantial holograph revisions and corrections in the author's hand on more than 100 pages. The front board depicting an exclusive alternative proof design for the dustwrapper, which differs from the one used on the proof copies and the regular editions. Copy B (in red ink) of three copies lettered A, B and C. Signed by the author on the title page. Fine as issued and much more telling than any proof copy and as close to manuscript material as we will ever get. Sold.





16. London: Viking, 1988. First Edition, First Printing. Copy V of the special edition of twelve copies, signed and numbered I to XII by Salman Rushdie, published simultaneously with the first trade edition. Printed on vellum antique laid and bound in goatskin. This copy belonged to the late poet Ted Hughes (though there is nothing that says so). It comes with the original unprinted paper wrapper. Anyone who spent a lot of money on the 1/100 signed, will always remember the feeling upon opening it the first time and finding out that there is this edition of XII as well. And if you go in for low numbers, this is the lowest you will get in a long time; I to IV being unavailable for various reasons. Sold.


17. London: Viking, 1988. First Edition, First Printing. Copy 95 of the special edition of 100 copies, signed and numbered 1 to 100 by Salman Rushdie, published simultaneously with the first trade edition. Printed on vellum antique laid and bound in goatskin and buckram cloth. It comes with the original unprinted paper wrapper. As new. Sold.






18. London: Viking, 1988. First Edition, First Printing. The first trade edition. First printing with the wrong ISBN number on the back of the dustwrapper. This was corrected in all subsequent issues (so in copies where the lowest number in the sequence is a 2 or any other higher number). Book is fine. Dustwrapper has very minor rubbing to the top edge and spine. Signed by the author on the title page. Sold.

19. London: Viking, 1988. First Paperback Edition, First (and only) Printing. Near Fine. Published simultaneously with the first hardcover edition. Signed by Author. THE Penguin paperback of which 10'000 were printed exclusively for the Indian market to forestall piracies. Practically all of these copies were later destroyed and only by a fluke a few (purportedly less than 60) made it to customers of bookshops in Malta and Switzerland. This is one of four "Swiss" copies that we know of and by far the best in condition, because they were all read in order to keep up with the unfolding news of the scandal and hoard the first edition of the hardcover copies in dustwrapper. The spine is slightly creased and rubbed, and there is a glue mark on the inside of the inner wrapper, where a label was removed, else the book is fine and signed by the author on the title page. Rushdie didn't bat an eye when he signed this for us. And yes: it is really true that the Penguin salesman came rushing into shops and took all copies that were there with him and probably onto a pyre. What a time for the Penguin! And this long before he was bundled off to Animalcatraz by Wallace and Gromit in the *Wrong Trousers*. No other signed copy has ever been offered. Sold.





20. Delaware: The Consortium Inc., 1992. First American Paperback Edition, First Printing. The first paperback edition that made it into the shops for more than a day and was hailed as an effort to protect the spirit of free speech and writing. Very minor rubbing to corners and top of the back wrapper, else as new. Inscribed by the author on the half title: "to Sophie / Best Wishes / Salman Rushdie." CHF 200.

## Two Stories

21. London: Privately Printed, 1989. First Edition, First Printing. Copy VI of XII copies privately printed and bound in full leather, with an extra set of signed prints by Bhupen Kharkhar and signed by the author. As new in like folding case. And as illustrated private press books go, this must be the truly beautiful. Sold.






22. London: Privately Printed, 1989. First Edition, First Printing. Number 5 of 60 copies privately printed and bound in cloth and signed by the author. As new in like slipcase. And as illustrated private press books go, this one is beautiful. Sold.

23. London: Granta, 1990. First Edition, First Printing. The Herbert Read Memorial Lecture 6 February 1990. Fine in wrappers. Signed by the author on the title page on publication. A clever, funny and illuminating essay. CHF 500.






24. No Place: Granta, 1990. First American Edition, First Printing. The Herbert Read Memorial Lecture 6 February 1990. Two or three tiny spots and creases, but very near fine in wrappers. Signed by the author on the front wrapper. The clever, funny and illuminating essay published in the U.S. and Canada for the first time. Sold.

## In Good Faith

25. London: Granta, 1990. First Edition, First Printing. Salman Rushdie on his way to embracing Islam in 1990. Fine in green wrappers. Signed by the author on the title page on publication. Not often found signed. Sold.



## Haroun and the Sea of Stories

26. London: Granta Books, 1990. First Edition, First Printing. Number 189 of 251 copies printed on Clan Book Wove and bound in calfskin leather, signed and numbered by the author. Fine as issued. Despite the high number of copies, this is a very difficult Rushdie item to get hold of, and a nice one. CHF 1'100.






27. London: Grant Books, 1990. First Edition, First Printing. Slight bump to bottom front corner, else fine in fine dustwrapper as issued. Signed by the author on the title page upon publication. Sold.

# Imaginary Homelands

28. London: Granta Books, 1991. First Edition, First Printing. Book and dust-wrapper fine. Signed by the author on the title page upon publication. His essays and criticism 1981-1991. Contains his rare declaration "Why I Have Embraced Islam" dropped from later editions. CHF 250.





29. London: Granta Books, 1992. First paperback Edition, First Printing. Book and wrappers fine. Signed by the author on the half title upon publication. His essays and criticism 1981-1991. The controversial declaration "Why I Have Embraced Islam" was dropped from this edition and replaced with "One Thousand Days In A Balloon." CHF 100.

# "The Wizard of Oz"

30. London: BFI Film Classics, 1992. First Edition, First Printing. Lavishly illustrated this is Salman Rushdie on Oz: clever, funny and touching. Signed by the author on the half title upon publication. CHF 550.

31. London: Jonathan Cape, 1994. First Edition, First Printing. Book and Dustwrapper fine. Signed and dated ("6.10.94") by the author on the title page upon publication. CHF 450.






- 32. New York: Pantheon, 1994. "Good Advice is rarer than Rubies" Fist Edition, First Printing. Booklet in wrappers is fine. The envelope, particularly the clasps, slightly creased, but still near fine. One of a limited edition of 2'000 copies with a tipped-in signature by the author. CHF 175.
- 33. London: Random House Audio Books, 1994. First Edition, First Printing & Recording. Cassettes a bit scratched and used, but still fine. Cover fine. Two cassettes read by the author and signed by him on the lower cover next to the title. CHF 150.

34. London: Jonathan Cape, 1995. First Edition, First Printing. Wrappers with a small scratch on the front, else book is as new. A low No. 36 in a limited edition of 1000 and signed by the author on the title page upon publication. CHF 250.





- 35. London: Jonathan Cape, 1995. First Edition, First Printing. Leather-bound book—all edges gilt—and slipcase are as new. No. 69 in a limited edition of 100 signed and numbered by the author on the title page upon publication. Sold.
- 36. London: Jonathan Cape, 1995. First Edition, First Printing. Book and slipcase are as new. No. 191 in a limited edition of 200 signed and numbered by the author on the title page upon publication. Sold.





- 37. London: Jonathan Cape, 1995. First Edition, First Printing. Book and Dustwrapper are as new. Signed by the author on the title page upon publication. CHF 175.
- 38. London: Random House Audio Books, 1995. First Edition, First Recording & Printing. Cassettes a bit scratched and used, but still fine. The lower cover creased. Four cassettes read by Art Malik. Signed by Rushdie on the top lower cover. CHF 150.

39. London: Jonathan Cape, 1999. First Edition, First Printing. Leather bound book—all edges gilt—and slipcase are as new. No. 43 in a limited edition of 150 (though this is not specified), signed and numbered by the author on the title page upon publication. CHF 1'100.

40. London: Jonathan Cape, 1999. First Edition, First Printing. Book and Dustwrapper fine. Signed by the author on the half title upon publication. CHF 250. Sold.







41. Los Angeles: New Star, 1999. First U.S. Edition, First Recording & Printing. Cassettes a bit scratched and used, though still fine. The box soiled, but still near fine. Eight cassettes read by Christopher Cazenove. Signed by Rushdie on the bottom lower part of the box. Sold.

42. London: Jonathan Cape, 2001. First Edition, First Printing. Book and Dustwrapper fine. Signed by the author on the title page upon publication. CHF 150.





43. London: Jonathan Cape, 2001. First Edition, First Printing. Book with one or two spots on front edge, else fine. Dustwrapper fine. Signed by the author on the title page. Sold.

## Miscellaneous Items

- 44. *Granta 3 The End of the English Novel*. London: Granta: London, 1980. Second Edition, First Printing. Wrappers very slightly rubbed along top of the spine, else fine. This is the 1989 limited reprint of Granta 3, originally published in 1980. Signed by Rushdie on the first page of his contribution from *Midnight's Children*—the chapters "The Perforated Sheet" and "Mercurochrome"—on page 17. Sold.
- 45. Firebird 1 Writing Today. London: Allen Lane, 1982. First Edition, First Printing. Book is fine. Dustwrapper faded from orange to yellow on the spine, else fine. Signed by Rushdie on the first page of his contribution—the story "The Free Radio"—on page 225. Sold.
- 46. *Shakespeare Stories*. London: Hamish Hamilton, 1982. First Edition, First Printing. Book and Dustwrapper are fine, pages browning as usual, though. Signed by Rushdie on the first page of his contribution—the story "Yorick"—on page 70. Sold.



- 47. *Encounter*. Vol. LIX, Nos. 3-4 (September-October 1982). First Edition, First Printing. Front wrapper very slightly creased, else fine and unfaded. Rushdie contributes the story "Yorick" on pages 3 to 8. Alas, it has not been signed. CHF 65.
- 48. Granta 7 Best of Young British Novelists. London: Granta, 1983. First Edition, First Printing. Paper edges browning. Wrappers lightly creased along spine and front bottom corner. Signed by Rushdie on the first page of his contribution—"The Golden Bough"—on page 247. Also signed by Julian Barnes on the first page of his contribution—"Emma Bovary's Eyes"—on page 59. Probably the most influential *Granta* ever. Sold.
- 49. *Granta 11 Greetings from Prague*. Harmondsworth: Penguin, 1984. First Edition, First Printing. Fine apart from a bump to the spine and minor marks to the wrapper. Signed by Rushdie on the first page of his contribution —"Outside the Whale"—on page 123. Also signed by Ian McEwan on the first page of his contribution—"An Interview with Milan Kundera"—on page 19. Sold.

- 50. *Granta15 James Fenton, The Fall of Saigon*. Harmondsworth: Penguin, 1985. Second Edition, First Printing. Originally published in 1985, this is the 1986 reprint. Fine apart from a bump to the top right-hand corner, so near fine only. Signed by Rushdie on the first page of his contribution—"On Günter Grass"—on page 179. CHF 60.
- 51. *The Bedside Guardian 35*. London: Collins, 1986. First Edition, First printing in this format. Fine as issued. Originally published as a book by Collins in London in 1986, this is one of only three lettered copies (This is copy G!) of Rushdie's introduction only, pages 7 to 11. Privately printed in 1991, beautifully produced on Ingres-Fabriano paper. CHF 270.





- 52. *Contemporary Writers*. London: The Book Trust, 1988. First Edition, First Printing. Original leaflet printed on both sides and folded three times with an essay by Maria Couto. As new. Signed by Rushdie on the inside above his printed name. Fine. CHF 125. Signed by Rushdie on the inside above his printed name. Sold.
- 53. *Prize Writing*. London: Hodder and Stoughton, 1989. First Edition, First Printing. Book and Dustwrapper are fine. An Original Collection of Writings by Past Winners to Celebrate 21 years of The Booker Prize. Edited and Introduced by Martyn Goff. Signed by Rushdie on the title page. His contributions "Errata': or, Unreliable Narration in *Midnight's Children*" and an extract from *Midnight's Children*—"Love in Bombay"—on pages 163 to 184. Sold.
- 54. *Freedom Forum*. First Edition, First Printing. Fine as issued and NOT mailed. A transcript of an interview with Salman Rushdie on C-SPAN, recorded in Washington D.C. on March 24, 1992. With remarks by Mike Wallace, CBS News. Alas, it has not been signed. CHF 120.

55. *Granta 39 – The Body*. Harmondsworth: Penguin, 1992. First Edition, First Printing. Fine in wrappers. Rushdie contributes the story "At the Auction of the Ruby Slippers" on pages 245 to 245. Alas, it has not been signed. CHF 70.





An A4 ringbound photocopy of the fair copy of the author's typescript showing the final but very substantial holograph revisions and corrections in the author's hand on more than 100 pages. The front board depicting an exclusive alternative proof design for the dustwrapper, which differs from the one used on the proof copies and the regular editions. Copy III (in red) of the ten copies numbered I to X. Fine as issued and much more telling than any proof copy and as close to manuscript material as we will ever get. Though not called for, this copy has been signed by Rushdie on the title page. Very rare. Sold.

## 58. The Rushdie Archive - Material on and by Rushdie

This archive contains material collected first towards a doctoral thesis, then towards a bibliography. It consists of thousands of original cuttings and photocopies of articles by and on Rushdie, as well as on Indian writers in English in general. The time covered is roughly 1981 to 1995. A substantial part is devoted to Rushdie before the Satanic Verses controversy and offers a totally different approach to the Rushdie subject. Some of Rushdie's own articles were later reprinted in Imaginary Homelands, though there are textual differences. The archive is structured as follows: Part One - Works by Rushdie: 0. Unpublished Works 1. Novels 2. Short Stories 3. Poetry 4. Non-fiction 5. Essays, Reviews and other writings 6. Interviews 7. Films 8. Videos 9. Translations. Part Two - Works on Rushdie: 1. Reviews 2. Specialist Studies 3. General studies. In addition there are many items concerning the Satanic Verses controversy as well as University papers on Rushdie and other Indian writers. It

would come with a bound proof copy of the bibliography. The ideal archive to start on a doctoral thesis on the subject. CHF Sold.







London: Jonathan Cape, 2008. First Edition, First Printing. Number 5 of 100 copies of the Blackwell Collector's Edition, signed by Rushdie on the title page. Fine in fine original slipcase. CHF 600.



## 61. Midnight's Children – Uncorrected UK Proof Copy in a UK Proof Dustwrapper.

London: Jonathan Cape, 1980. First Edition, First Printing. A fine copy (slightly bent with some spots on the top and front edge, but apparently unread and the wrappers without the usual fading) of the very rare and fragile uncorrected English proof in the original proof dustwrapper, which is slightly faded and creased on the spine. The English proof copy of *Midnight's Children* is exceedingly scarce, much more so than the American one. Over the last thirty years we have had four copies, including this one, and have established that in same time-span only around ten copies have been on offer. However, no copy of the English proof in an English proof dustwrapper has ever appeared on the market until now. The book itself differs from the first English edition printed in the US in that it has an earlier copyright date (1980 and not 1981), was printed in England, has cut edges, is a different format  $(6^{1}/8 \text{ by } 8^{3}/8 \text{ inches or } 15.6 \text{ m})$ by 21.2 centimetres), has a different pagination 442 instead of 446 pages (this is because the recto and verso of the title pages of Book Two and Book Three – though present in the proof – were not paginated), does not have any page numbers for the individual chapters on the *Contents* page and the title page is printed in larger type. The proof dustwrapper differs from the first edition dustwrapper in that "PROOF ONLY PROVISIONAL PUBLICATION DATE FEBRUARY 19 1981" is printed on the edge of the lower flap. It also varies from the trade dustwrapper in showing a little bit more of the original artwork and in omitting the photograph of the author (as well as the photographer's name) on the lower flap. For a long time this item was owned by someone who worked at Cape at the time Midnight's Children was in the works. It was then sold to a Booker collector, who in turn sold it to a prominent dealer in Booker firsts. At some time we were informed of the item's existence and acquired it immediately. Also, we were able to establish that the book has been protected by its dustwrapper ever since it was published, which explains the fact that the covers of the proof have not faded at all. In short, this is a unique opportunity to buy a fine copy of the earliest available state of Midnight's Children and the only one so far (the last 50 years) to be accompanied by its original proof dustwrapper.
